A letter from the Thailand National Director



I've changed. I'm not exactly sure when it happened since it didn't happen all at once. In fact, to be honest, I'm sure the change is still taking place. As I look back I can identify specific incidents in my life which have been instrumental in this change. These important events all had at least one thing in common as they showed how relief and development can positively affect lives. This change has strengthened my desire to improve the quality of life for those suffering in Burma.

As a pilot with a degree in math and computer science I'm wired for technology and numbers. I appreciate statistics and tend to see things in black and white. The information in this report represents the activity of Partners Relief & Development (PRAD) during the past year. As an organization we are accountable to you and want you to see how these resources have been used. But, these pages represent much more than money and how it was spent, they are a reflection of needs met and lives changed.

In a short time with Partners Relief & Development I've had many opportunities to visit villages and pockets of Internally Displaced Persons living inside Burma. On these visits I've gained a better understanding of the work of PRAD and the positive effect that work is having on those suffering in Burma. On a recent trip I spent almost a month visiting PRAD projects and learning more about the very real needs. I saw fish ponds, pre-positioned rice to be used in times of attack, rice mills and barns, schools, children's homes, clinics, communications equipment, batteries, solar panels, moringa trees, and many other items purchased by PRAD with funds represented in this report. I saw village health workers being trained in basic hygiene and healthcare. I was overwhelmed by the level of activity performed with such limited resources. It's impressive that such a small organization can have such a considerable impact. I really believe it's because we are part of the heartbeat of God, providing as much hope as we possibly can with whatever means He provides.

On each of my trips into Burma I see the same things over and over again. One is the degree of suffering. The names change, the stories are similar, but the suffering is constant. Until the situation in Burma changes, and until the people can live without persecution, we will continue to do all we can to meet their needs. Something else repeated over and over again is the amount of appreciation people have to PRAD for the help we provide. This appreciation extends to you, since none of what we do would be possible without your support. So, the numbers and graphs in these pages are more than an annual report, they are a heartfelt thank you from the people of Burma.

ONE VILLAGE AT A TIME

Emergency relief mission in Karen State

I remember the morning well. It was a warm Monday on December 6th of 2010 and we had just wrapped up our weekly meeting. It was a day in the office not unlike any other. Phones ringing, keyboards typing and the shuffling in and out of people in their daily routines. I had placed my lunch order not long ago, unaware that I would be leaving before the delivery arrived. I paid no mind to the conversations surrounding my desk until I heard the tones change. You could feel it in the air. Something had happened. Something was happening right then. It was heavy.

In a moments notice, I watched the office transform from a docile calm into a bustling command post. Reports went live, supplies were sourced and relief efforts mobilized. It was time to go. The satellite phone call that changed the course of the day came from inside Dooplaya District, Karen State, Burma. It was from a Free Burma Ranger team who was in the heat of the action and in need of essential life saving supplies.

Fighting had escalated between the Burma army and ethnic Karen resistance fighters and a village of around 600 civilians was being targeted by State Peace and Development Council (SPDC) mortars. Scrambling with all they could swiftly grab, villagers scattered into the jungle. Around 200 fleeing men, women and children were led to safety in the next two days. It would be at this site of relative safety where emergency materials from Partners Relief and Development would reach them.

2400 kilos of rice, tarps for roofs and enough clothes to supply the 36 families in hiding arrived hours later. With the recently freed Aung San Suu Kyi and an estimated 20,000 refugees flooding through the border town of Mae Sot, Thailand that month alone, Burma was not without attention. Amidst this unusual flurry of Burma in the global headlines, this attack went unnoticed and undocumented by international media.

Both commonplace and horrifying, this story is the story of thousands of internally displaced families living in constant fear and flight from Burma army attacks. This is the story of people who are forced to forfeit everything they own, fortunate to escape with nothing more than life and limb. These are people hopeful for beginning again in peace and strong enough to live this way their whole life. It is these people, these children, that our conviction leads us to. We desire free, full lives for the children of Burma and with your generosity can work to support and heal these broken communities, one village at a time.

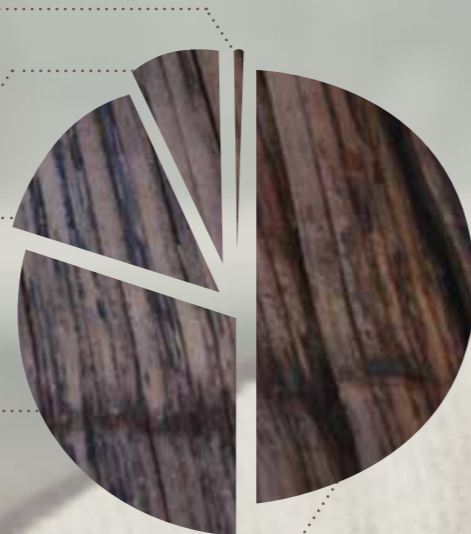
